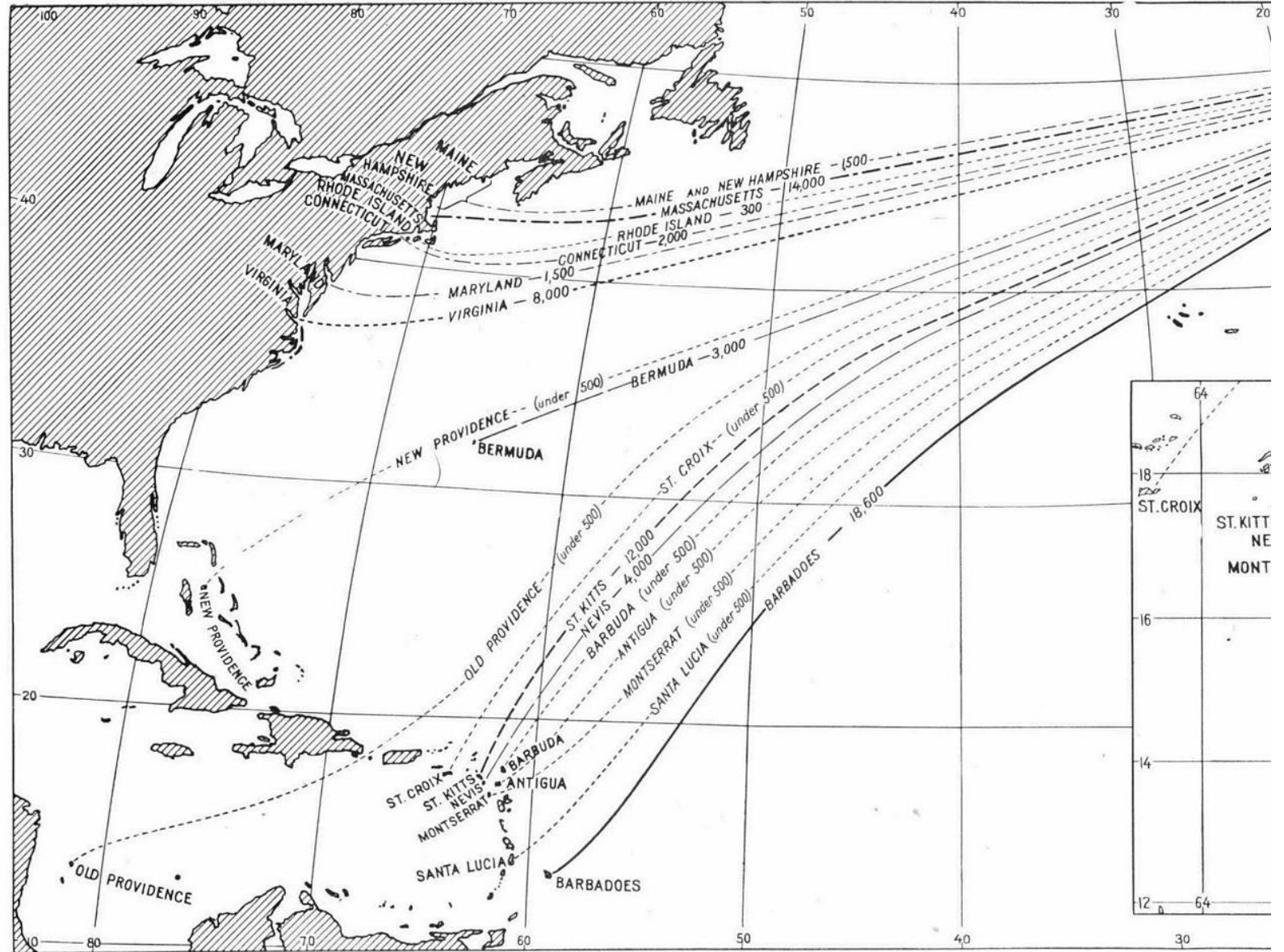

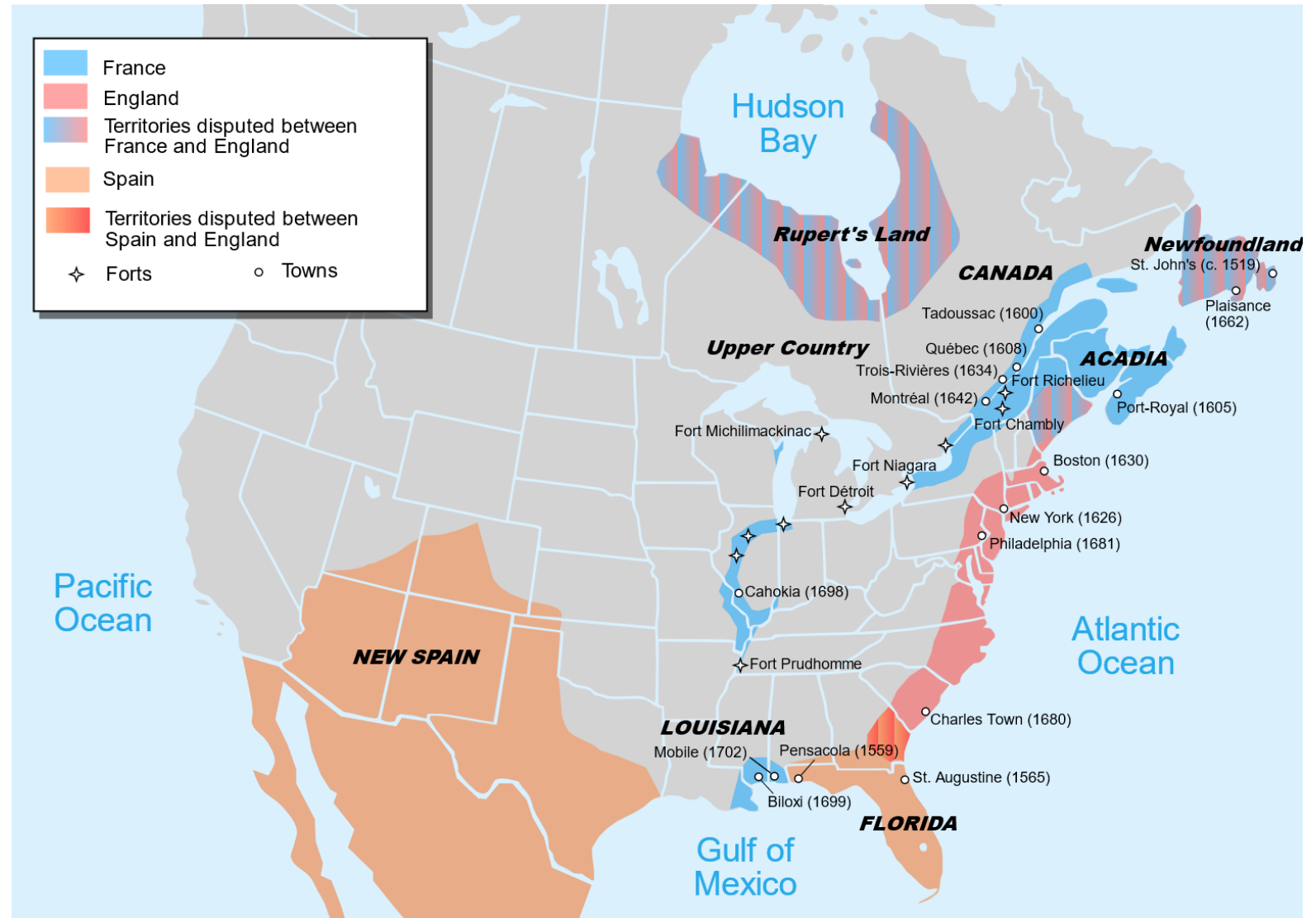

The following quantities, at least, of Water and Provisions (to be issued daily) will be supplied by the Master of the Ship, as required by law—viz., to each Statute Adult, 3 quarts of Water daily, exclusive of what is necessary for cooking the articles required by the Passengers Act to be issued in a cooked state; and a Weekly Allowance of Provisions according to the following scale:—24 lbs. of Bread or Biscuit, not inferior in quality to Navy Biscuit, 3 lbs. Wheaten Flour, 1 lb. Oatmeal, 1 lb. Rice, 1 lb. Peas, 3 lbs. Potatoes, 1 lb. Beef, 1 lb. Pork, 2 oz. Tea, 1 lb. Sugar, 2 oz. Salt, 1 oz. Mustard, 1 oz. Black or White Ground Pepper, 1 gill Vinegar, 6 gills Lime-juice, 1 lb. Preserved Meat, 6 oz. Suet, 8 oz. Raisins, 4 oz. Butter.

SUBSTITUTIONS at the following rates may, at the option of the Master of any Passenger Ship, be made in the above Dietary Scale—that is to say, 1 lb. of Preserved Meat for 1 lb. of Salt Pork or Beef; 1 lb. of Flour or of Bread or Biscuit, or 1 lb. of Beef or of Pork, for 1 lb. of Oatmeal, or 1 lb. of Rice, or 1 lb. of Peas; 1 lb. of Rice for 1 lb. of Oatmeal, or vice versa; 1 lb. of Preserved Potatoes for 1 lb. of Potatoes; 10 oz. of Currants for 2 oz. of Raisins; 24 oz. of Cocoa or of Coffee, roasted and ground, for 2 oz. of Tea; 1 lb. of Treacle for 1 lb. of Sugar; 1 gill of Mixed Pickles for 1 gill of Vinegar.

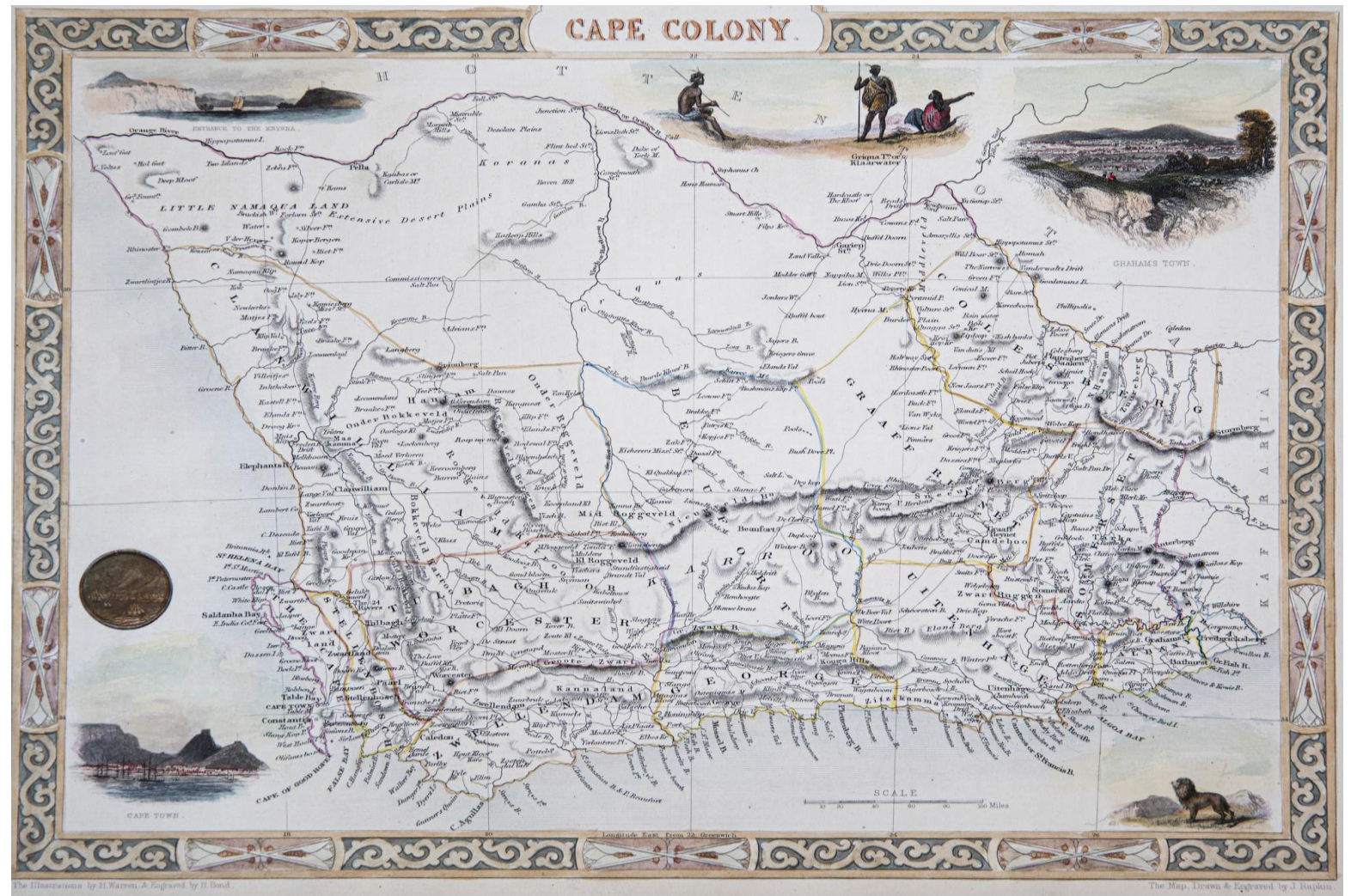

PASSAGES.

- FREE PASSAGES.**—QUEENSLAND.—To selected unmarried Agricultural Labourers and single Female Domestic Servants (apply to the Agent General). No Free Passages to any other Colony.
- ASSISTED PASSAGES.**—WESTERN AUSTRALIA.—£10 is allowed to Farmers, Agriculturists, and others likely to be useful in country districts; but a deposit of not less than £100 (to be refunded on arrival in the Colony) is as a rule required before any assistance is given.
 QUEENSLAND.—Assisted passages are given to unmarried labourers connected with the land, as Ploughmen, Gardeners, &c., and to Female Servants, at the following rates:—Males, 12 to 40, £8; 40 to 55, £12. Females, 12 to 40, £4; and 40 to 55, £12.
 No Assisted Passages are given at the present time to CANADA, NEW SOUTH WALES, VICTORIA, SOUTH AUSTRALIA, TASMANIA, NEW ZEALAND, THE CAPE or NATAL; but in the case of QUEENSLAND and the CAPE passages at lower rates are given, under special conditions, to Labourers engaged here by employers in these Colonies.
 In the case of QUEENSLAND, Land Order Warrants to the value of £20 are given under certain conditions to persons paying their own passage direct to the Colony.
- NOMINATED PASSAGES.**—QUEENSLAND, WESTERN AUSTRALIA, and NATAL.—Residents in these Colonies can, under certain specified conditions, nominate their friends for Free Passages on making payments in the Colony as under:—
 QUEENSLAND.—Males, 1 to 12 years of age, £2; 12 to 40, £4; 40 to 55, £8; Females, 1 to 12, £1; 12 to 40, £2; 40 to 55, £8. Confined to Agricultural and other Labourers connected with the land, and Female Domestic Servants.
 WESTERN AUSTRALIA.—On payment of £7 to a limited number of Nominators, approved by the Crown Agents for the Colonies.
 NATAL.—£12 per adult.
 No Nominated Passages are at present given to CANADA, NEW SOUTH WALES, VICTORIA, SOUTH AUSTRALIA, TASMANIA, NEW ZEALAND, or THE CAPE.

ARRANGEMENTS ON LANDING.

CANADA.—Depôts for emigrants are provided at the ports of Quebec and Halifax and the other principal towns in the Dominion.
 NEW SOUTH WALES.—Apply to Mr. G. F. Wise, Immigration Agent, Hyde Park, Sydney.
 QUEENSLAND.—There are Depôts at the principal ports and in various parts of the Colony, in which Government assisted emigrants are received free of charge for a few days after arrival.
 WESTERN AUSTRALIA.—There is a Labour Registry Office at Perth where Emigrants should apply, but no Government Depôt for the reception of Emigrants is now open.

There are no Government Depôts in VICTORIA, SOUTH AUSTRALIA, TASMANIA, THE CAPE, or NATAL; but there are private agencies in some of these and the other Colonies, particulars of which are given in the Circulars.

PRESENT DEMAND FOR LABOUR.

FARMERS WITH CAPITAL.—A demand in all the Colonies.
 FARM LABOURERS.—A demand for good men in CANADA, NEW SOUTH WALES, VICTORIA, QUEENSLAND, TASMANIA, and some parts of NEW ZEALAND.
 MECHANICS AND GENERAL LABOURERS.—Some demand in MELBOURNE, especially for men connected with the building trades. Little or no demand in any other Colony.
 FEMALE DOMESTIC SERVANTS.—A good demand in most districts of Canada and the Australasian Colonies, and a slight one at The Cape. Particulars as to the state of the Labour Market in the various Colonies from time to time will be given in subsequent editions of this Poster.

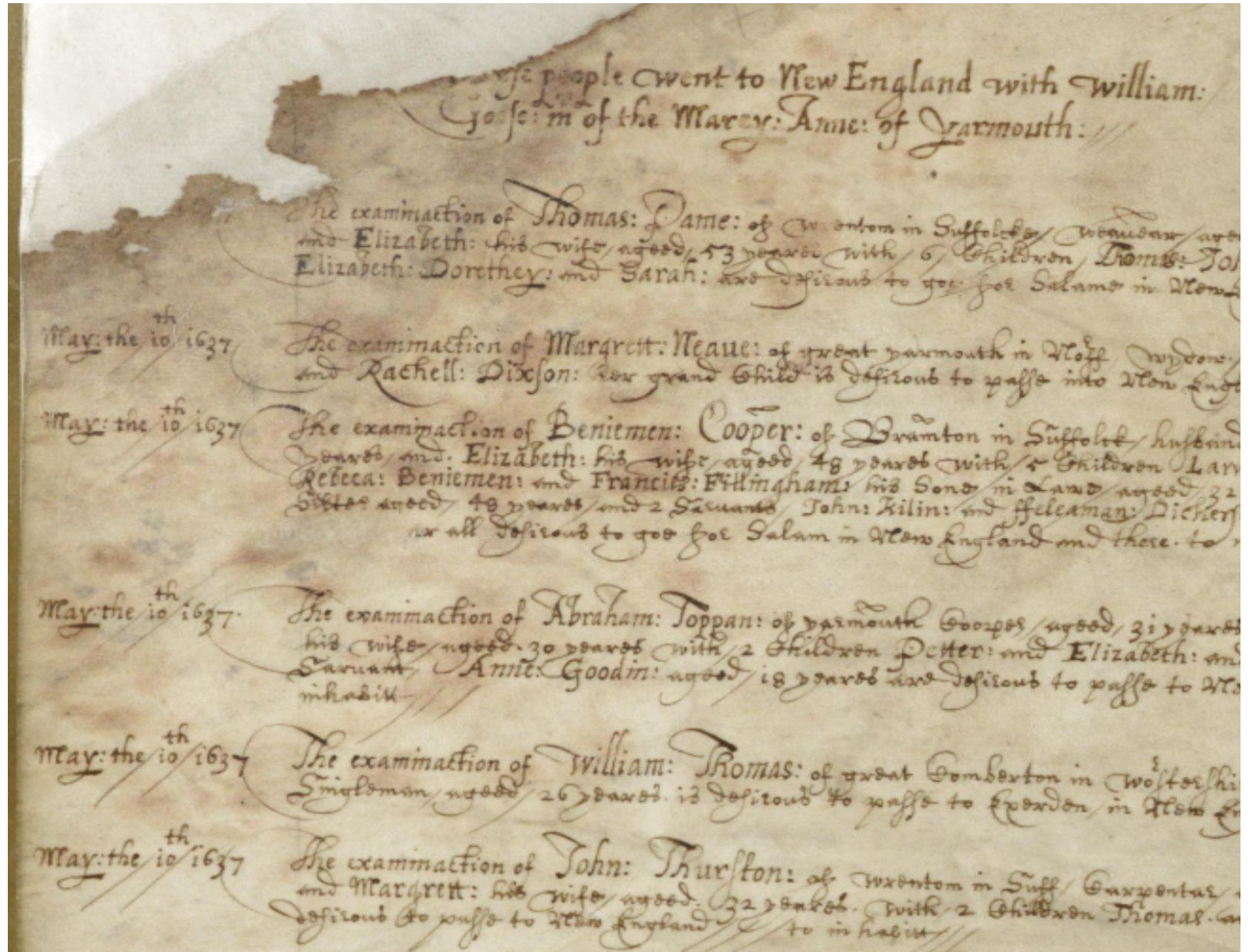

Welcome to the website of the Petworth Emigration Project

The Petworth Emigration Project began in Canada and in England as a collaborative case study in the social history and genealogy of nineteenth-century emigration and immigration. Under the sponsorship of the third Earl of Egremont, the Petworth emigrations were a remarkable example of sustained assisted emigration.

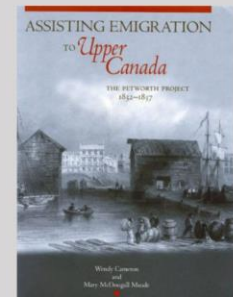
Assisting Emigration to Upper Canada uses the sources of landlords and government to narrate the emigration of some 1,800 emigrants from Sussex and near-by English counties to Upper Canada (Ontario) between 1832 and 1837. *English Immigrant Voices* turns to the emigrants and the letters they wrote describing their life-altering decisions and their new lives in Canada.

Through biography, the project has taken new directions to follow two people who rose from humble beginnings through their connections with the third Earl of Egremont and Petworth House.

Poor Cottages and Proud Palaces follows the full life of Thomas Sockett, the rector of Petworth and the man behind the Earl's Petworth Emigration Committee. *Elizabeth Ilive, Egremont's Countess* as the mistress, and eventually the wife, of the 3rd Earl participated in the society of artists, scientists, and experimenters in agriculture who frequented Petworth House.

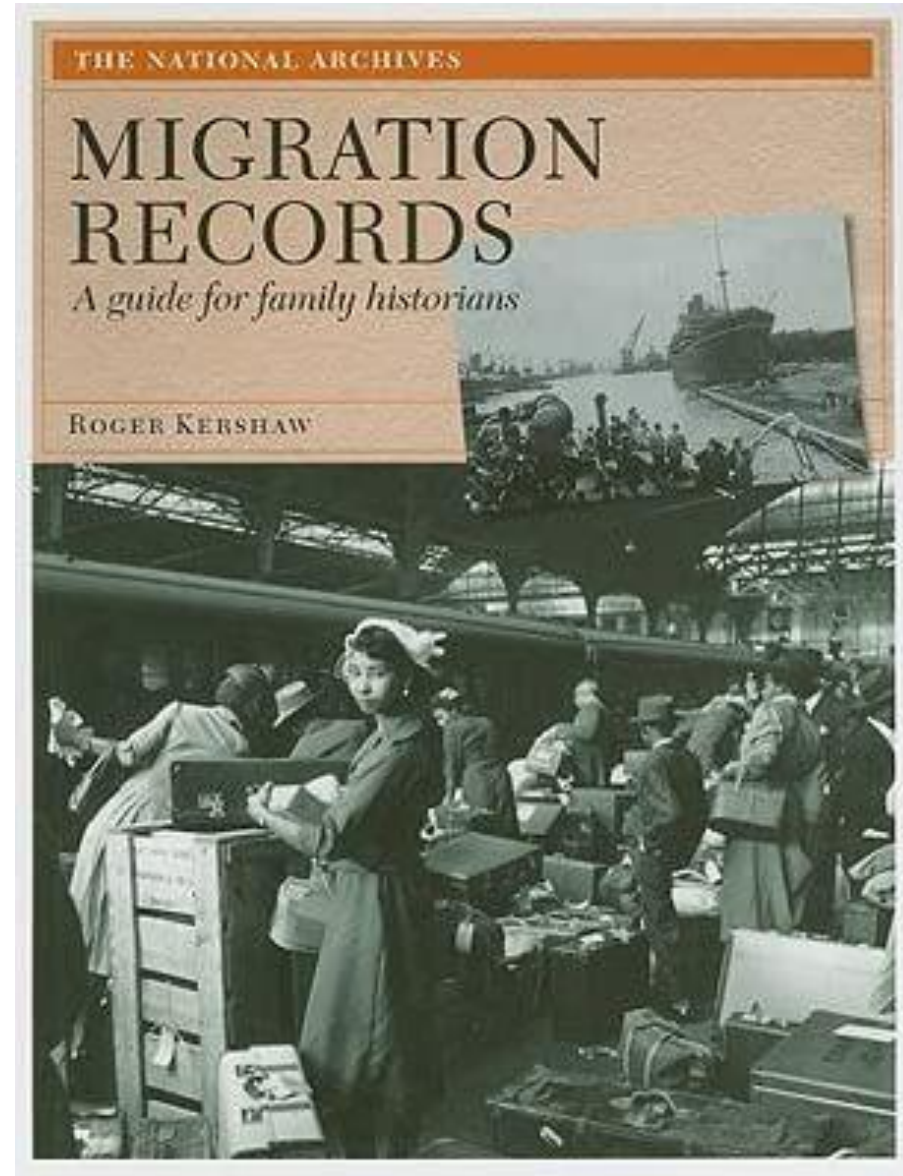
